











### Empowering Young Minds Through Innovation

At the time of writing, New Zealand's workforce of just under 3 million people includes nearly 540,000 workers with a STEAM qualification. Recognising the importance of Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Mathematics (STEAM) in primary education, Owairoa's awesome educators continue to work hard to implement an innovative ISTEAM

program, which inspires and empowers young minds to explore and excel in these increasingly important fields.

In Room M2, students have embarked on a fascinating journey into Aotearoa History as part of their ISTEAM curriculum. Engaging with the Māori pūrākau (legend) of Kupe and the Giant Wheke, they dove deep into the fascinating cultural heritage of New Zealand. Inspired by Kupe's story, the students designed and developed nets to catch fish, which explored the notion of providing sustenance for their whānau, just as Kupe did long ago. This hands-on approach not only heightened their understanding of our history, but also fostered problem-solving skills and provided explicit focus on the Key Competency, Relating to Others.

On the opposite side of the school, Room 8 witnessed the intersection of science and creativity as they delved into the realm of animal biology. Utilising their knowledge of the different body parts mammals, reptiles, birds and fish have, the students crafted a model of a 'combination creature', called Creature X, using Play-do. This interdisciplinary project not only honed their artistic skills, but also nurtured their scientific inquiry and critical thinking abilities.

Meanwhile, in M14, budding entrepreneurs were honing their business acumen. Developing business plans for "M14's Shark Tank," the students were tasked with constructing a board game and presenting their plans to convince their teacher to 'invest' in their company. This project not only provided a platform to showcase their creativity, but also instilled crucial skills in strategic thinking, communication, and financial literacy.



With both the Owairoa 1st and 2nd teams playing in five 7-a-side games, the girls demonstrated their football skills, teamwork, and resilience.

The Owairoa 1st team proved their mettle by securing three victories throughout the tournament. Their campaign kicked off with a resounding 8-0 triumph, showcasing their attacking prowess and ability to find the back of the net. Although they faced a challenging goalless draw against Macleans Primary School, the girls displayed great defensive skills and kept their opponents at bay. In a closely contested match against Ormiston Primary School, the Owairoa 1st team fought valiantly but narrowly lost by a score of 2-3.

# 8 Great Habits to Being a Leader

At the end of the day-long session, students then use their new knowledge to create a talk to the rest of the House Leaders, as well as Mrs Bull about what they learnt that day, the habit they need to work on, how the new learning will help them at school and home, along with developing a personal mission statement that they can refer to in the future.

This recognition is a testament to the innovation and design excellence that went into creating this remarkable structure for our school. The project started with a vision to build a cutting-edge facility that led to the construction of an amazing facility that caters to modern teaching methods here at Owairoa Primary School, while accommodating our growing student population.

Our team of architects and designers from RTA Studio worked closely with our school and the Ministry of Education to understand our needs and goals for this space. They then drew inspiration from their extensive research and incorporated the latest trends in educational design to create a facility for our school that is both functional and beautiful.

As part of the judging process, we welcomed the architects and judging jury on site to do a tour of the amazing facility. They looked at how the building exterior functions and interacts with the landscaping and exterior play spaces, creating an atmosphere that promotes creativity, productivity, and learning. They also showcased the state-of-the-art inside features, looking at how the flexible learning environments were designed to include shared breakout for creative work and smaller focus learning spaces, depending on the desired level of student and teacher collaboration, as well as stopping to admire the expansive view of the Howick community from the top storey.

We were extremely proud that the 'Alan McIntyre Centre' has been recognised as winning recipient for this award, especially in such a competitive field. We would like to express our gratitude to RTA Studios for their hard work, dedication, and creativity. This award is a testament to the power of teamwork and collaboration, to bring this exciting vision here at Owairoa Primary School to life.

This term, our Junior School has embarked on a thrilling new initiative centred around mental health education and the overall wellbeing of our children. We believe that nurturing their emotional and mental growth is just as important as their academic development.

Through our partnership with the MITEY programme, we were lucky to have a visit by Mitey Coach Rob Edmondson to work with our students.

An initial lesson was focussed on showing and discussing emotions, along with how we feel in certain situations. Many students showed excitement at the prospect of a dinosaur at the door!

Throughout the rest of the year, we will be engaging in activities, discussions and using resources that promote learning about resilience, self-care, and building positive relationships.

It is great to see the positive impact this initiative is already having on our Junior School community, and we look forward to seeing our children flourish as the year progresses.

Middle School students recently joined forces with over 2 million students worldwide to participate in a simultaneous storytelling event centred around the children's book "The Speedy Sloth." This experience allowed students to delve into the magical world of author Rebecca Young and witness the artistic brilliance of illustrator Heath McKenzie.

Learners gathered in front of their classroom TV screens, awaiting the live reading of "The Speedy Sloth" by Rebecca Young herself. Through her engaging narration, Rebecca Young transported us into a world where a seemingly ordinary sloth steps up, perseveres, overcomes the challenge of a race, and is still home in time for dinner. The story's underlying themes of integrity and self-esteem resonated within our school community, aligning with two of our R.I.S.E values.

Following the reading, our excitement grew as Heath McKenzie took the virtual stage. With his artistic prowess, he skilfully guided us through the process of illustrating the book, demonstrating his techniques, and even treating us to a live drawing session. This was followed up in many middle school classes with drawing lessons around Spike the Sloth.

We are grateful to have been part of this remarkable event, 'joining hands' with millions of other students from across New Zealand and Australia.

Since ancient times children have needed to learn how to measure things, and it is still an important mathematical skill our young Owairoa learners are trying to master.

Our Year 5 and 6's have been working on getting to grips with different forms of measurement, including capacity, weight, height, depth, volume, and temperature. Using many different types of fun, hands-on activities, classes have been learning the language of measurement to better equip themselves for living in our world.

Often these tasks provide visual connections and in depth understanding of the concept. A lesson might include measuring our surroundings, such as calculating the perimeter of our astroturf.

In ISTEAM accurate calculations are important in science investigations, or in the length and area of a mini house construction. Making paper plate clocks, so that we can get to grips with 5-minute intervals, has provided fun visual connections.

These essential skills are needed for our everyday tasks such as cooking or organising things in our homes, as well as checking if the shop assistant gives the correct change!

After the learning comes the much-loved phrase, 'time for morning tea'. Also, we need to know what time to turn up for our senior duty responsibilities, and of course, when is the all-important 'home time' bell?

# Beat the Winter Blues

For some, the colder weather and shorter days can take a toll on their physical and mental health. In children, just as in adults, it is very common to feel a change in mood and energy levels during the winter months.

Shorter days mean less sunlight, causing our internal clocks to be out. This can affect sleeping habits and energy levels. In addition, chilly temperatures often mean staying inside and swaying from regular schedules.

While we cant change the season, the good news is there are things we can easily do to help minimize the effects of feeling these winter blues.



#### 1. Exercise:

Keeping active either inside or outside is very important. If you can brave the outdoors, get in some daily movement outside to burn off energy.

#### 2. Eat healthy:

A balanced diet is key in keeping a healthy body. Be sure to stay away from sweets and instead, focus on seasonal fresh fruits and vegetables.

# Winter Wellness

Winter wellness becomes a priority around this time, as the colder months of the year arrive.

The change of season brings a multitude of bugs and viruses, ranging from colds, the flu and stomach bugs.

Many of these bugs are highly contagious, so we ask that you be vigilant about monitoring your child's heath. If your child is unwell, please keep them at home.

Should your child become unwell during the school day, our office staff will contact you to collect your child from school. Please ensure we have current mobile numbers so that we can contact you if needed.

We are beginning to see Covid cases increasing in our school community again. RAT tests are a fast way to test if your child is showing any of the symptoms of Covid-19.

A reminder that the following Covid-19 rules are in place:

- If someone in your family has Covid, they must isolate at home for 7 days.
- · Household Contacts do not need to isolate.
- All Household members are expected to do a RAT test daily for 5 days, from the date the person with Covid-19 tested positive.
  - For siblings still wanting to attend school, please do a RAT test each morning before coming to school.
