













### The Great NZ Shake Out

On Thursday the 19th October at 9.30am, the whole school participated in the 'New Zealand ShakeOut' Whakahaumaru Aotearoa. New Zealand ShakeOut is our national earthquake drill and tsunami hīkoi.

Twice a year, schools are required to hold practice drills, so students know what to do if there is an emergency such as an earthquake. ShakeOut takes place remind people of the right action to take during an earthquake. The process is Drop, Cover and Hold.

Drop, Cover and Hold for 30-60 seconds:

**DROP** down on your hands and knees. This protects you from falling but lets you move if you need to.

Shake Shake

**COVER** your head and neck (or your entire body if possible) under a sturdy table or desk (if it is within a few steps of you). If there is no shelter nearby, cover your head and neck with your arms and hands.

**HOLD** on to your shelter (or your position to protect your head and neck) until the shaking stops. If the shaking shifts your shelter around, move with it.

While you are doing the drill, take note of what might be happening around you in a real earthquake. Think about what you might need to do to prepare for a real earthquake. You might like to discuss with your children what to do if an earthquake strikes while you are at home. It is good to be prepared.



### Welcoming our School Kaumataua

It is with excitement and pleasure that we announce that Mr Hemi Raukura has agreed to be our School Kaumatua. A kaumātua is a respected tribal elder in the Māori community who is appointed for the capacity to teach, guide and support both current and future generations.

Hemi Joseph Raukura was a foundation pupil, attending Owairoa Primary School from 1964 – 1966. Continuing his education locally, he attended Howick Intermediate then moved on to Pakuranga College.

Hemi has been part of the Owairoa community for many years. He works with many schools in the East Auckland area as a Kapahaka tutor, assisting Kapahaka Tutors, designing Kapahaka costumes and making poi.

During the school term he volunteers at the local O Wairoa Marae on Uxbridge Road in Howick as Kaumatua-

Whaikorero speaker for powhiri/welcomings. In his spare time, Hemi takes care of the bush walk in Emilia Maud Nixon's Garden of Memories in Howick.

Hemi is a taonga, a treasure to the Howick community. By joining our Owairoa Family in this role, Hemi will continue to offer support to our school going forward. We welcome him and look forward to continuing this positive relationship with him.



# **Mathex Competition**

On Tuesday 17th October, Miss Findley and a team of four senior students from Room M13: Luka, Arthur, Alexander and Ryan proudly represented our school at the 2023 Inter School Mathex Competition.

Hosted by Sunnyhills Primary School this year, our team joined with 22 other local Primary Schools in this challenging and fast-paced mathematics contest, involving answering 25 maths word problems in 30 minutes; so, speed and accuracy were important. Our students had plenty of practice leading up to the competition, using their Prime books, our participation in the Otago University Problem Solving Competition and practice sessions using previous Mathex questions.

Our Owairoa mathematicians had a notable performance and were focused team players, showing great perseverance answering the questions. Although they did not place this year, we congratulate Cockle Bay who came first place with a perfect score. It was a nail biter finish for second place and there was a tie breaker question for Baverstock and Bucklands Beach Intermediate, which Baverstock Oaks won.

She was well known for the different groups and activities she started including turning her classroom into a castle, the mediators, starting the school magazine, collating two time capsules of children's work, and being part of the 50th Jubilee celebrations.

She has enjoyed working with Mr McIntyre over the years, and she has always admired and appreciated his ability to pull together some amazing school events which children still remember long after they depart such as the Red Balloon day, the Medieval week which included horses and riders in full gear jousting on the field; the Guiness book of records for the longest snake in the world; the tower where BOT members spent the night, the Eagle helicopter landing on the field, the Operettas, Big Boys Toys days, the arrival of the "Queen" in her Rolls Royce, to name a few!

Mrs Bull has been the Staff Representative on the School Board of Trustees since the Board of Trustees system first started in schools and she has enjoyed the opportunity of representing the Staff over that time. She was also Staff Representative on the PTA for many years and helped to coordinate the school Galas and organize all the Staff and school side.

Her main highlight of all the years was running the week long school camps at Snells Beach, and Camp Raglan, these were always a wonderful opportunity to get to know all Year 5/6 children and their parents who came as helpers. "I am so grateful for the richness which being associated to this school has brought to my life. I have always felt that teaching was a calling and I am privileged to have been 'called and served'.



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### **School Board Update**


In my Property portfolio I have over the last few years enjoyed the developments in school property and with the final term now underway the Board awaits news from the Ministry of Education that we can finally proceed with the upgrade of classrooms 10 to 13. This will bring the last of the original school classrooms up to a modern learning environment standard.

To date the project has not been without its challenges in terms of delays, high costs etc but with Board and Ministry of Education support, we have found a way to fund the development and look forward to work on the ground commencing in the near future.

Whilst the students and staff vacated the classrooms at the start of term in anticipation of a prompt start, we still await the formal process of approval and we then need to negotiate with the preferred contractor as to when they can start the work. We anticipate we will be able to take advantage of the Christmas break and complete the project by the end of Term One 2024.

The proposal is to upgrade the classrooms on the same basis as the upgrades of the other two original blocks, with four standard classrooms opening onto a shared space, ancillary rooms, along with upgraded toilets.

Once we are able to move into the remodelled block, the Board will then turn its attention to the relocatable classrooms that remain on our playing fields and will focus on our next projects which will be shared in upcoming school newsletters.

# **ROAD SAFETY**

Thank you to those parents who continue to follow the road safety rules around our school. By carrying their sports balls in a bag, students reduce the risk of accidents that may occur if they were to bounce/kick them while walking to and from school. Carrying the balls also teaches students to be responsible and considerate of their own safety and the safety of others, contributing to a safer environment on the footpaths around our school.

All students participated and shared something they are passionate about. The event left a lasting impact, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation for the diverse talents that make up the Senior School students.








# JUNIOR POETRY COMPETITION


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
