


# PTA Annual Meeting




The PTA are seeking nominations for Co-Chairperson and Co-Secretary. These are shared roles, so you will have the support of an experienced committee member and will share the workload.

We are asking for your assistance in locating some missing school library resources.



These covers pictured below are some the library books that went 'missing' from our shelves last year. Each of these resources holds significant value to our library collection, with a replacement cost of \$350.







# Construction Zone Progress

Progress is well underway for the development of our new classroom block upgrade for Rooms 10-13. This long-awaited project finally started over the Christmas holidays and is providing good entertainment for our staff and students as they eagerly watch with the project unfold.

The construction team are making steady progress, with all demolition now completed. They are working on the concrete slab foundation extensions and framing currently, as well as rewiring for the new electrical and IT connections.

The project is anticipated to take 14 weeks, with an expected move in date to the newly refurbished building in early May.

## **AT Planned Minor Improvements**

**Auckland Transport** (AT) have notified us that they will be implementing minor road improvements in Elliot Street. They will be installing 'no parking on the grass berm' signage, meaning people will not be able to park on the berm from the mid-section of Elliot Street on both sides of the road towards Wellington Street.



AT received a request to install signage to stop vehicles from parking on the grass berm outside Blundell Park Playground in Elliot Street, Howick. A Howick Local Board member has raised the request on behalf of a frustrated parent who walks their children to and from Owairoa Primary School.

These changes will encourage legal parking on Eliot Street and are scheduled to take place at the end of April 2024.



# Winner, NZ Architectural Awards

The New Zealand Institute of Architects announced our newly constructed 'Alan McIntyre Centre' a winner at the 2023 New Zealand Architecture Awards.

The 18 classroom block was nominated for the Education category, and designer RTA Studio was proudly announced as the national winner at an awards dinner held in Wellington at the end of last year.

The New Zealand Architecture Awards jury was led by 2020 Gold Medal award-winning architect Dave Strachan. The jury visited 61 short-listed projects across 13 categories.

Judges said: "On a site bordered on three sides by residential dwellings (creating more restrictive controls), the architects have, by cutting into the southwest slope, created a two-storey building, allowing more space at ground level for outdoor activities. Planning is deceptively simple, providing a variety of quiet and more active spaces. ... An extensive colour palette creates a practical, yet playful space for the young students and their very happy teachers."

On a site bordered on three sides by residential dwellings (creating more restrictive controls), the architects have, by cutting into the southwest slope, created a two-storey building, allowing more space at ground level for outdoor activities. # Principal Colleague's Message Goes Viral

A Principal colleague who has worked in the profession for more than 50 years recently shared the following letter with his school community at the start of this year.

These words of wisdom went viral around the world, defining the role that both parents and teachers play, along with his reminder to parents that education starts at home.

School is about to start for 2024, so I am asking you to please sit down with your tamariki for just 5 minutes and explain that being very tall, short, chubby, skinny, black or white is no joke, and that you should not tease other kids if you think they are one of those!

That there is nothing wrong with wearing the same shoes every day, or in fact wearing no shoes at all!.

Explain to them that a used backpack, or brown paper bag carry the same dreams, and do the same job as a new one.

Teach them not to exclude someone because they are "different" or do not have the same opportunities as others. Explain that teasing hurts...and that they go to school to LEARN, NOT to compete.

Our learners are excited each week to cool down in the pool after a hot day of playing on the playground. As lessons have been taking place, it has been great to see individuals give different things a go as their water confidence increases and they become more daring.

Each week, we have been learning about the water and how to get in and out of the pool safely. Although they may prefer to see who can make the biggest splash, each learner has shown great enthusiasm and excitement about being back in the water and developing their swimming skills.

We are also very lucky and thankful to have Miss Sotutu to support our learners in the pool. With her ability to encourage and develop water confidence, many learners show a greater enjoyment towards their swimming. Her warm smile and water knowledge ease any uncertainties or nerves as the children develop in their self-esteem, knowing that they will have a fun swimming lesson.

Year 3 have been busy learning all about the Chinese New Year. Chinese New Year is an annual celebration of new beginnings, happiness, and family reunions. It is one of the most important festivals in Chinese culture.

Learners in M6 got creative with Chinese calligraphy, and practised writing "Happy New Year". M4 enjoyed an informative video about the different Chinese zodiac animals and their symbolic meanings. M5 got creative and made their own pop-up Chinese greeting cards. M7 had fun learning origami and crafted their very own dragon fortune tellers. In addition to these engaging activities, learners participated in many whole class discussions to enhance their knowledge about the traditional Chinese culture.

Learners across Middle School unleashed their imagination, drawing vibrant dragons, symbols of good luck and using origami techniques to create paper dragons. Adding to the excitement, International Students eagerly shared their cultural knowledge and traditions. Some even wore their red tang suits on the special occasion. In addition to cultural exploration, Year 3 learners also engaged in learning basic Chinese commands. Through fun and engaging activities, the learners practised phrases such as hello (ni hao) and thank you (xièxie).

Many books were shared about the Chinese New Year, learning about the traditions, customs, and symbols. Inspired by the stories they read, learners then made their own paper lanterns using symbolic colours and designs. Year 3 were captivated by the colourful descriptions of the dragons, significance of the red envelope and mouth-watering delicacies enjoyed during family reunions.

This week-long celebration of the Chinese New Year was a time of discovery and creativity where every activity brought new insights and joyous experiences. It was a week filled with fun learning and a shared sense of connection as the school community came together to embrace the Chinese New Year celebrations!

## Senior Blog Lunar New Year



The beginning of the 2024 school year coincided with the celebration of the Lunar New Year. As part of the 12 year cycle, this year saw the return of the Year of the Dragon. Those born this year, or in 2012, 2000, 1988, 1976, 1964, 1952, 1940 or 1928 are said to be charismatic, intelligent, confident, powerful and are naturally lucky and gifted, and tend to do everything to the best of their ability with high standards.

Across the Senior school, classes have learned more about the Lunar New Year and undertaken a variety of learning to mark the occasion. With a great opportunity to create some wonderful art, here are some examples: Some classes constructed lucky red envelopes. These often contain financial gifts that, when passed to others, are said to bring prosperity.

Another art activity was the constructing of dragon puppets. This involved colouring the head and tail of a template which were then connected by a piece of folded paper that springs inwards and outwards (much like an accordion). Two sticks were attached, and when moved, create the appearance of a Chinese dragon, similar to those that dance in parades.

One lucky class was taught how to make geometric Chinese patterns by the International Students, which can be seen in the accompanying picture. I think we can all agree they look amazing. The final mention is for the beautiful close-ups of a dragon eye completed in pastel.

The Lunar New Year was also celebrated outside of school. There were many community initiatives with one of the most well-known and popular being the Lantern Festival. Those students who attended shared how mesmerising all the lanterns were. The Lantern Festival marks the end of the Lunar New Year celebrations and provides an opportunity for people to remember those who they loved, that have now passed, while bringing hope to the year ahead.

# **SCHOOL HEALTH UPDATE** 48 hour Stand Down


Following a case of vomiting or diarrhoea, your child must be symptom free for 48 hours before they can return to school.


