Memorable Visit from the Minister of Education

We had the honour of hosting Hon. Erica Stanford, Minister of Education and Minister of Immigration on her first official visit to Owairoa Primary School on Wednesday 3rd April.

During her visit, Hon. Stanford met with our Principal and Senior Leadership Team where we showcased our reputation for Excellence in Education and emphasised the strong sense of pride that permeates throughout our school, as well as the family ethos that we so proudly promote.

One of the highlights of the discussion was sharing about our Education Review Office (ERO)





visits and the positive outcomes that have resulted from their recent evaluation. Another key aspect we celebrated was the implementation of the 'One Hour a Day' initiative, focusing on reading, writing, and maths.

We also discussed pressing challenges facing our education system, many of which directly impact our school, including the growing demand for learning support and the strain this places on resources and staffing. Attendance rates and the shortfalls of funding for Teacher Aides were also identified as areas requiring urgent attention as well as discussing the general staffing crisis looming over the education sector.

After the formal discussions, Hon. Stanford was invited to join a tour of our school campus, where we took great pride in showing her our successful building projects, including our impressive 18 classroom block.

Hon. Stanford had the chance to participate in a science lesson with Room G6, where she eagerly looked through a microscope at plant cells, before quizzing the students on their recent learning of the Solar System.

Phones Away for the Day

Our School Board recently consulted with Parents regarding the implementation of the new Government regulation around the prohibition of cell phone in schools and all personal communication devices, including smart watches.

As discussed, the Government has introduced regulations that require all schools to have student phone rules in place by Term Two. The regulations require that schools must ensure students do not use or access a phone while they are attending school, including during lunch time and breaks.

Thank you to those parents who took the time to respond. Consultation feedback received was overwhelming in support of these new regulations.

The new "Phones away for the Day" regulation will come into effect at our school as from Monday 29th April 2024.



Classroom Upgrade Progress

Excitement continues daily as our staff and students watch the steady progress of our Room 10-13 classroom renovation project. With each passing week, significant milestones are achieved, bringing us closer to the completion of this transformative project.

The development upgrade is progressing well, meeting the projected timeline. In the past week the aluminium joinery has been installed, marking a significant step towards modernising our learning spaces.

Behind the scenes, essential electrical services have now been connected, ensuring that our classrooms will be equipped with the latest technological advancements to support innovative teaching and learning practices.

As the project continues to unfold, rigorous council inspections are ongoing, ensuring that our renovation project adheres to the highest standards of safety and quality assurance.

The anticipated completion date is set for the end of May 2024, when we eagerly await the unveiling of our newly renovated classrooms.



The premise of this day was to make accessible all the amazing sports groups and hobby organisations in our local area, to families, not only in our school whanau, but to the wider Howick community.


There were 23 clubs that came along and showcased their activities, alongside a fun zone, spookers room, cake room and sausage sizzles.

One of the highlights was creating underwater silhouettes of their favourite sea creatures. Learners crafted stunning artwork using pastel, dye, and paint. Learners put their creativity to work by designing a sea-themed bulletin board in the shared space outside M8. With vibrant colour and sea animal designs, the shared space transformed into an underwater paradise, captivating the attention of everyone who passed by.
