

Year 2 have been learning about Space in Science so Room G4 shared their knowledge about the planets and showcased some of their art to go along with the facts.


Room 2 shared their fabulous orca whale artwork they had completed during Sea Week. They recited a poem to show what they had learned.

Pataka Kai Community Pantry

Owairoa Primary School is proud to support our community in many ways. One of our special contributions to the community is the Pataka Kai pantry located on Wellington Street, close to the pedestrian crossing entry on Wellington Street.

The Pataka Kai is a community pantry initiative where those of us who might be struggling to put food on the table can access food donations. With the cost of living and especially food constantly going up many people find themselves with little money left over to provide their families with three meals a day.

Each week a class is responsible for food donations, families will be emailed and if you are in a position to donate a food item it can be delivered to Mrs Taka's office (next to Room 4) where the Pataka Kai monitors will collect it and place it in the pantry. You are of course welcome to contribute at any time.

We ask that food donations are nonperishable and within their use by date. Other items of donation could be toothbrushes, toothpaste and sanitary items. Please do not place used clothes, books or rubbish in the Pataka Kai.

This initiative also provides positive teaching and learning for our students. It encompasses our Owairoa RISE values and helps children understand concepts around gratitude and community service.



Young Innovators Inventors Fair 2024



This Term we are encouraging our learners to become young innovators, working towards developing, creating and designing an invention or outcome that will help to solve a real-life problem. Students will be working either as a class, in small groups or individually, using a theme/inquiry that they have chosen in their classroom.

The inventions will then be proudly exhibited in our school hall at our 2024 EXPO Young Innovators: Inventors Fair on Tuesday 2nd July from 3pm - 7pm. Families will be invited to come and view the many varied and fabulous inventions on display.

The final day of Term 1 saw Senior School students and staff gathering around our school's flagpole and white crosses on display. Some proudly wore a red poppy on their uniform, others were carrying hand-made poppies which they had created in class.

All were there to attend the ANZAC Day Commemoration Assembly, which is held at Owairoa Primary School annually around ANZAC day. Students had all been learning about the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) and the events that took place in Gallipoli on 25th April 1915.

House Leaders respectfully led the somber event, which included the readings of a number of significant texts. They reminded the attendees of the reasons why we commemorate ANZAC Day and explained the significance of poppies. The poems "In Flanders' Fields", as well as the "For the Fallen", were listened to in respectful silence. All students had memorised the words to "The Flag", which they recited in unison. Finally, we watched as the NZ Flag was raised, which was followed by a minute's silence.

Learning about what has happened in years gone by, helps us to understand and appreciate the world that we live in presently.

"I can't sing"

A long time ago, one of my students said to me "I can't sing.", and I asked them "How do you know?" He said his parents told him that, and it made me realise that we were all singers and dancers once upon a time, but we just stopped. Whether it is because of our own insecurities or others' harsh feedback, most of us eventually decide we are not good enough to make music. Based on my study of Orff Music and Dance Education at Mozarteum in Salzburg, my goal in life is to break down this barrier and turn the people I meet back into the musicians they once were.

In our Owairoa Primary School music specialist classes, the overriding philosophy is that everyone can enjoy making music together, no matter whether they are an absolute beginner or a professional musician. We begin by using body percussion to develop our understanding of rhythm as the fundamental element of music creation. After that, students explore percussion and melodic instruments including xylophone; metallophone; piano; marimba to compose their own music. Throughout this process, the aim is for students to compose music together with joy so that they realise how easy it is to make their own music and rhythm.

After each student has created their own short piece based on a rhythm, we end our classes by coming together and playing our pieces in sequence to enjoy each other's creativity and see how music can be combined into an integrated piece. The goal for Term 2 is for students to form groups and create music together, with each student taking on a different role in the group. When students perform with a partner or in a small group, they develop their social skills and learn with and from each other.

The music specialist classes foster creativity and confidence through letting students express themselves freely without the fear of making mistakes. Everyone should come away feeling positive about the experience, assured about their musical abilities, and more willing to perform in a supportive environment in front of their peers. Most importantly, we aim not for perfection, but for students to enjoy creating music together. In that sense, I am proud to say that this year's music specialist classes are a resounding success.

Junior Blog Reduce, Reuse and Recycle



Reduce, Reuse and Recycle was the theme of the entertaining Food Scrap show the Junior School had the privilege of watching during Week 10 of Term 1. The show was aimed at educating the learners about the new Food Scrap bins that have been rolling out in our community and all-over New Zealand, where Auckland Council want our rukenga kai to turn into clean energy and liquid fertiliser to grow more kai. The Junior School enjoyed learning about reducing our food waste and recycling to ensure our landfills are used for the correct purpose.

Freddy the Food Scrap fairy went on a journey to locate a missing sandwich that had been dumped into the incorrect bin and found its way to the landfill. Her adventure was filled with thrills, excitement and in the end, friendship. Through this story, the learners were able to learn what goes into each bin and how to sort out the different items. The learners participated in the show by identifying the different items that needed to either be recycled, reused or placed into the Food Scrap bin.

Owairoa became a Green Gold Enviro School in 2016 and we endeavour to educate our tamariki about reducing waste, reusing items and recycling different materials. This will be leading into our ISTEAM and Science programme where we will be exploring the Material World. We as a team, empower the learners to be Tidy Kiwi's by picking up litter around our school, having a waste-free lunch and keeping their classrooms clean by using our recycling bins

Middle Blog Planet Earth and Beyond



Learners in the Middle School have been enjoying getting underway with their ISTEAM learning. Our science focus for Terms 1 & 2 is Planet Earth and Beyond.

All classes have been learning about the Sun, the Moon, other planets, tides, gravity, seasons and solar eclipses. Next term, they will focus on rocks. Many classes have taken their science learning into their ISTEAM projects.

Room M3 have created informational posters about the planets in our Solar System. They have also been developing Google Slides presentations around their chosen planet, which have been presented to the class. Mrs Leslie worked with the learners on their oral language in preparation for sharing in front of their classmates.

Room M2 has been exploring the concept of 'space junk' in many ways. They have explored many shared texts around this concept, as well as written creative haiku's around the space junk problem.

Room M2 worked with Miss Hewlett to develop an eye-catching diorama of the space junk issue. These started with creating paper mâché representations of Earth. The final pieces are still in progress!

Senior Blog Kura Kino Kē! Cool Schools!



In the Senior School we will be running a Peer Mediation Programme done through The Peace Foundation. This programme promotes peaceful conflict resolution in primary schools throughout Aotearoa. This will help our children build positive, caring, and safe relationships with others, especially in times of conflict during morning tea and lunch times.

There are some very excited Year 6's who will be part of this programme, beginning Term 2. These children will support the duty teachers and help our students manage everyday issues that come up in the playground.

When this programme is implemented, many schools experience a reduction in conflict and an increase in students understanding that some behaviours are not acceptable. This aligns with all the Key Competencies, especially Managing Self and Relating to Others.

Training started in Week 9 and was completed in Week 10. These children will be getting a badge and a jacket to make them stand out in the crowd. We also have the Mediation Tardis where the mediators will make their base.

We can't wait to start, and the children are raring to go.
