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

Mental Health and Wellbeing

At Owairoa Primary School, we define wellbeing and mental health as nurturing our Hauora through our RISE values in an inclusive and supportive environment that empowers our Owairoa family to feel



secure, take learning risks, manage emotions with positive coping mechanisms, and reach their potential.

Our school is in our second year of the Mitey programme. Mitey is a New Zealand specific approach developed by the Sir John Kirwan Foundation, and provides an evidence-based approach to teaching mental health education to our students.

The Mitey programme is built around the New Zealand curriculum and embedded into everyday learning, to ensure our students are equipped with the age-appropriate skills and knowledge they need to recognise and respond to mental health issues in both themselves and others before they enter teenage years.

Mitey in Action:

Our students are learning how to recognise and respond to their own mental health status and those of others. Cultivating good mental health helps us cope with life's ups and downs, and to feel comfortable asking for help from others when we need it.

Our classes often blog about what they are learning as part of the Mitey Programme.

This latest blog post 'A Mitey Initiative' shares some exciting learning in Junior School over the recent weeks....

A MITEY INITIATIVE

Mitey is an initiative to support students mental and emotional health through discussing emotions, relating to their peers and learning ways to deal with how they feel in different situations. In Team 1B we have been exploring Mitey through our students' interests, books and promoting positive interactions with one another.

In Mitey we use a range of activities and games to share experiences, act out scenarios and build our confidence when sharing our feelings. In Team 1B we have been doing activities that involve everyone!

A great activity is standing in a circle and stepping in when they agree with the



question that gets called out. This is a fantastic activity which allows students to share their opinion and relate to their classmates. The questions ranged from "Do you think cats are better than dogs?" to "have you ever felt sad?". By mixing the questions from easy light-hearted questions to questions about different emotions, it allows the students to get more comfortable and encourages them to join in.

Another activity we use in Team 1B is Freeze Frames to highlight different emotions in different scenarios such as when they had to say a speech in front of everyone by themselves. Emotions are a hard topic to discuss, and it can be hard to target the emotion you are really feeling so this initiative supports learners in developing their strategies when having different feelings. Room 8 has made their own emotion cards to use as a reference and display when doing Mitey which is a fantastic tool to support learning conversations.

Mitey can also be used in most curriculum areas such as our Literacy though big books and poems, Writing, Maori and Social Sciences.

Team 1B love learning about Mitey so please feel free to ask your learner about it and find out more things they have been doing in their classes to support their emotional and mental health.

HEALTH WARNING CHICKENPOX

A number of students are currently absent from school with Chickenpox.

Chickenpox often starts without the classic rash, with a fever, headache, sore throat, or stomach ache. These symptoms may last for a few days, with the fever in the (38.3°–38.8°C)

range. The red, itchy skin rash usually starts on the stomach or back and face.

Chickenpox is infectious from 1 to 2 days before the rash starts. It stops being infectious when all the blisters have crusted over. This happens usually 5 to 6 days after the start of the rash.

Please be vigilant and look out for symptoms.
