

# ALICE THE MUSICAL



One of the highlights of this term was the Senior School Production of Alice the Musical. In a captivating display of talent, creativity and hard work, Year 5 and 6 brought to stage this production based on the story

of Alice in Wonderland. A cast of 21, with the support of an ensemble of 300 children (every Senior School classroom) performed over three nights to a sold out crowd.

It was a display of energy, teamwork, imagination, dance, song and the magic of storytelling. It was a wonderful opportunity for our Owairoa community to come together again and it was uplifting to see parents, siblings and extended whanau coming every night to support, encourage and celebrate our amazing group of performers.

It was genuinely a team effort to produce a show of this magnitude, involving 300 learners and it was reliant on the passion, creativity and dedication of everyone involved. The Property Team built parts of the set and talented Teachers and students designed and painted it. Teachers, Parents and families helped creating the backdrops and the vibrant costumes, as well as decorating the hall and the foyer. The Office and Support Team designed the programmes and tickets, advertised and sold the show. Teachers and Parents helped every night with makeup, supervision, ushering and selling refreshments. The Senior Management Team has supported the production for every step, in every possible way, including being there to encourage the performers every single night. Then it was the team running the show every night: teachers co-ordinating student stagehands and the team in charge with lighting and sound.

Every senior student had a chance to be on the stage, performing one of the nine songs of the Musical and it took hours and hours of learning and practising these. Finally, it was the fantastic effort of the main cast, a group of 21 talented children who worked for four months, sacrificing almost every lunch time over two school terms to bring to light the magical characters of Alice the Musical. And what a great job they did!

Finally, special thanks must go to Director, Mr Alex Cornea. He spent many long hours working with our students rehearsing their roles and bringing the whole show together. Mr Cornea's love for drama and his passion with helping our students shine on stage made this production an unforgettable experience for everyone involved.

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On Wednesday 21st August Owairoa Primary School celebrated International Day. Students arrived at school dressed in their cultural attire and proudly walked to their classrooms to prepare for the day's events.

International Day commenced with a magnificent parade around the school where students walked according to the country they identified with. Senior Students were selected as banner holders to lead and support younger students along the route. Parents watched and cheered as their children marched, waving flags to accompanying music.

At the end of the Parade all 63 nationalities represented at our school assembled on the Astroturf where students joined together greetings in different languages, enjoyed a few items and speeches and sang two songs. Parents gathered around the Astroturf as flags representing an assortment of nations hung from the balustrade above, adding to the ambience of the event.

Culturally themed activities in classrooms and a concert in the hall showcasing the talent of Owairoa Students, were two of the highlights of International Day. The students aging from Years 1-6 performed culturally significant dance, poetry, musical items, and songs in front of their peers. We also had the pleasure of welcoming visiting groups from Bucklands Beach Intermediate School and Macleans College who performed for our students.

The International Day "Kiwi Lunch" was extremely popular with students of all ages. Our thanks go to the PTA and parent helpers who helped prepare and distribute the many hundreds of lunches to our students.

#### Hon. David Seymour Visits Our School

Last Friday, we had the pleasure of welcoming Hon. David Seymour, Associate Education Minister, to our school. He met with our Senior Management Team to discuss a topic he is deeply passionate about—student attendance.

After the discussion, Minister Seymour toured some classrooms, engaging with students and observing life around our school campus. His visit was a great opportunity for both staff and students to learn more about the government's focus on improving school attendance.



At interval time, Minister Seymour addressed our staff, emphasizing the government's goal of having 80% of students attend school for more than 90% of each term by 2030. "To achieve this, schools need to aspire to reach an average daily attendance rate above 94%," he said.

This year, the government introduced daily attendance reporting (as shared in previous newsletters), which Seymour highlighted as a valuable tool. "High-quality attendance data is helping students, parents, and school communities identify absence, talk about the importance of school attendance, and measure positive change over time," he added.



# HPPA Netball Stars Shine

Our Year 5 and 6 students participated in the recent Interschool HPPA Netball competition. They competed in six games against other East Auckland schools in the A and B grade, over the two day tournament.

Both of our Owairoa Teams did exceptionally well and our teams were excited when it was announced that we won both grades overall, taking the two trophies.

Our students have been training since Year 4 and have shown commitment and development over the years. Our avid players showed excellent skill, stamina, fitness and speed throughout the competition.

# New Zealand Maths Week

Maths Week was established by the New Zealand Association of Mathematics Teachers (NZAMT) in 1998. It is one of the premier mathematics event in the New Zealand school calendar, with an estimated audience of more than 250,000 students, teachers and parents from around New Zealand participating in this great event each year.

This year Maths Week was in Week 5, from Monday 19 August to Friday 23 August and around our school, different activities inside and outside the classroom were completed with the children using a range of mathematical skills.



In our Junior School, daily challenges were run by Mrs Rice, encouraging students to estimate and predict. The week started on Monday with a Balloon Bonanza and challenges ranged from how many balloons could fit in a recycling bin, to how many pieces of popcorn in a container.

Junior classes participated in problem solving tasks throughout the week. Room 10 had fun with an ISTEAM egg challenge. The students worked in small groups to wrap an egg in paper to protect it from being dropped from various heights around the school. Most eggs managed to withstand the drops from lower heights, but only one egg survived the tallest drop from the staff room. Room 4 showed different ways to make combinations to 10 by using class members feet – relating to the picture book "One is a snail, 10 is a crab" by Jeff Sayre and April Pulley Sayre.

In the Middle School, Year 4 completed the Maths Week daily dollar challenges each day in exchange for house points. Our excited learners loved working with their peers to solve a range of problems. Some classes also did some out of the box problem solving.

The Middle School learners then made predictions about what the Teachers would be able to do in the Maths Week Challenge afternoon. Teachers put their physical abilities to the test on the astroturf and completed a series of challenges to the entertainment of the learners. Shoes may have come off.

The Senior School completed different activities including using the website to play the interactive learning games, to how many times can the ball go in the hoop in a minute or how many children's feet it took to measure the length of the field.

Maths Week was another success this year, and over the course of the week, our students learnt much about prediction, actual results and different mathematical vocabulary.



# Senior School Speech Finals

On Thursday, 22nd August, our Senior School hosted the much-anticipated Speech Final, centered around the theme of "Unity." After weeks of preparation, every student had the opportunity to present their speech in class, and from there, a few were selected to advance to the next round. Fourteen finalists were then chosen to compete in the grand finale.

The event was full of talent, with each student confidently addressing the theme of unity in their own unique way. After much deliberation, the judges announced the winners:

**Charlie Yeoman - 1st place**, with his insightful speech on the Olympics.

Hugo Scordino - 2nd place, with his thought-provoking speech on the importance of not littering.

Blake Tolson - 3rd place, with her inspiring speech on teamwork.

The event was made even more special by the musical contributions from our talented students. Tang Tang and Lucas Lin provided beautiful piano music as guests arrived. During the judges' deliberation, Sophie Li and Junyi Luo treated the audience to a delightful musical interlude.

Congratulations to all the finalists and a big thank you to everyone who participated in and supported this event. It was a memorable day that highlighted the hard work, creativity, and unity of our students.


Some of our Senior Students were invited by work with Suzy Cato and share some online Book Reviews which have been uploaded to her YouTube channel – Kids Talk About Books.

#### Junior Blog BSLA Journey in the Junior School



The Junior School have begun their exciting structured Literacy journey with the Better Start Literacy Approach (BSLA). BSLA aims to support children's early reading, writing and oral language success.

It includes the systematic teaching of critical phonological awareness skills and letter sound knowledge skills through fun, games-based activities, activities making explicit links to the reading and spelling context, and structured small group reading sessions using the new Ready to Read - Phonics Plus early readers series. In addition, the approach includes explicit teaching in vocabulary skills and in building children's oral narrative and listening comprehension skills through quality children's story books'

A whānau workshop was held in Term 3 for all Year 0-2 Parents. There were over 70 parents in attendance. The teachers were able to show the various resources used, what the approach looks like in the classroom, how whānau can help at home and display the different picture books and ready to read readers that will be sent home. There have been several parents that have approached the teachers and have said they have really enjoyed the new learning their children are doing at school and have loved the suggestions from the whānau home learning sheets on how they can help at home.

Learners are loving the new Ready to Read - Phonic Plus books, the quality, shared picture books and the new Literacy games that consolidate the learning that has happening during the week. They are learning new skills like segmenting, blending, identifying phonemes and blends and gaining new English and Te Reo vocabulary.

#### Senior Blog Team 5 is Looking MITEY Fine



As we hurtle our away through another jam-packed term at New Zealand's number one primary school, Team 5 has been sure to build on last year's introduction to Sir John Kirwan's mental health program, MITEY.

With more than half of New Zealand's young people suffering from anxiety or depression before reaching adulthood, we understand the importance of being at the forefront of mental health advocacy and providing our tamariki with some of the tools they require to become resilient, confident rangatahi.

Mrs Minnaar may be new to Owairoa, but she has certainly hit the ground running when it comes to assisting her learners with creating a more positive internal monologue. While using the movie Inside Out to engage the students, the class explored the talents and capabilities that are unique to each of them.

Mrs Minnaar further developed this concept through sharing a sophisticated picture book entitled, The World Needs Who You Were Made to Be. The exposure to a text filled with empowering vocabulary inspired the creative children to produce reverse poetry, a concept that highlights how something can begin in a negative fashion, but is ultimately transformed into a work of affirmation when considered from a different perspective.

Pertinent opportunities for growth have also been on offer in Room M15, as Mrs Job focused on the importance of kindness and how powerful or damaging our own words can be to others. To add context to this notion, the inquisitive ākonga produced a guideline which will certainly aid them in thinking before they speak: If the person the comment is aimed at cannot change the focal point of the comment for the better – wearing glasses for example – then the words should not be spoken. This particular emphasis was a strand taken from the umbrella of teamwork; creating a strong, supportive network of peers within a classroom, who can and ought to raise each other's spirits, rather than tear them down.

MITEY is making waves across Aotearoa and for all the right reasons. We at Owairoa fully support what Sir John Kirwan has set out to do and will continue to push forwards with building positive mental health in the wonderful students at our school.


