#### The Great NZ Shake Out



On Thursday 24th October at 9.30am, our school participated in the 'New Zealand ShakeOut', our national earthquake drill and tsunami hīkoi.

Twice a year, our school hold practice drills, so students know what to do if there is an emergency such as an earthquake. ShakeOut takes place remind people of the right action to take during an earthquake. The process is Drop, Cover and Hold.

#### Drop, Cover and Hold for 30–60 seconds:

DROP down on your hands and knees. This protects you from falling but lets you move if you need to.

COVER your head and neck (or your entire body if possible) under a sturdy table or desk (if it is within a few steps of you). If there is no shelter nearby, cover your head and neck with your arms and hands.

HOLD on to your shelter (or your position to protect your head and neck) until the shaking stops. If the shaking shifts your shelter around, move with it.



# Conservation Week 2024



**Room 12's Hector's Dolphin focus** - During Conservation Week, Room 12 shared the book "Little Hector and the Big Idea", a story of a little Hector's Dolphin who helps to save his habitat from the fishing nets and plastic rubbish.

We learned that the Hector's Dolphin is one of the smallest dolphins in the world and that it is indigenous to Aotearoa, New Zealand. They are recognisable by the shape of their dorsal fin, which is rounded like Mickey Mouse's ear. They are on the endangered species list because they get caught in gillnets and then drown because they cannot come up to breathe air.

We found out, that plastic rubbish kills them because they eat it, thinking it's fish. The plastic stays in their stomach, and so eventually they starve. We need to protect our Hector's Dolphins by stopping trawling with gillnets and recycling our plastic.

**Room 10's Buzzing Environmental Week** - During Conservation Week, Room 10 had a fantastic time learning about honeybees. We explored what these bees look like, where they live, and how we can help protect them.

Observing our school's honeybee hives gave us a unique, real-life experience. It was exciting to see the bees in action and understand more about their busy lives in the colony

#### **School Garden Replenishment**

With all building work around the newly refurbished Year 2 classrooms having been completed, Conservation Week was also the perfect week to replenish nearby gardens and borders. We are sure you all agree, they look fantastic!

Our school takes part in a 'Paper for Trees' programme, where we receive new plants in return for recycling our paper waste. Many of the established plants around the McIntyre Block are a result of this programme, and have grown substantially over the past two years. Most recently, the Kaitiaki added another 30 plants alongside the new block.

#### Kings of the East Auckland Jungle

The pinnacle of the primary school sporting calendar rolled around again during Term 3, as the boys travelled to William Green Domain to compete in the highly contested HPPA football tournament. With a well-drilled and extremely talented squad intact, the Owairoa Lions were ready to pounce on their most recent opportunity to get their paws on some evasive silverware.

The hungry cubs hit the ground running, putting on an early display of dominance against a Howick Primary side that struggled to get out of first gear. Owairoa talisman, Jace Yip, opened the scoring with a deft finish following a mazelike run through the middle and 'fox in the box', Zach Rossiter, showed his predatory instincts by latching on to a goalkeeper error to double the lead. Following three tightly contested games, where the mighty Lions showed themselves to have unbelievable sportsmanship in the face of a somewhat bemusing refereeing decision, they ultimately finished the competition in second place but deserved much more.

This fantastic group of boys proved themselves to be an extremely talented set of footballers with impeccable integrity and all at Owairoa are proud of their conduct and tremendous achievement.

#### Māori Language Week 2024

This year's Māori Language Week was celebrated from 14th – 21st September. The theme for the week this year was "Ake, Ake, Ake" or "A Forever Language".

Māori Language Week is a week dedicated to the learning of Te Reo throughout Aotearoa. It was first observed in 1975, so next year will be the 50th anniversay of this important movement. Te Reo has only been recognised as an official language of New Zealand since 1987.

Māori Language Week at Owairoa provided our learners and Teachers the oppurtunity to engage with and experience Te Reo and Tikanga Māori through many different activities within their classroom. Students were able to learn through Literacy, Art and Environmental activities as well as waiāta (songs) and kōrero tara (myths/legends).

Many classes also researched the history of our school name "Owairoa" and the origin of our school house names. Our school house names represent four of the Great Fleet of Waka that travelled across the Pacific Ocean to Aotearoa, Tainui, Takitimu, Tokomaru and Aotea.

Many of our learners are able to present their own pepeha or mihi, this provides students with the opportunity to practise their speaking of Te Reo and share with others where they are from. The students enjoyed practising this throughout the week.

Being engaged in Te Reo and Tikanga Māori at Owairoa isn't only limited to Māori Language Week, it happens all the time, however the week is a great chance to really focus on it's importance to Aotearoa and everyone who lives here.
