












## Swinging for Success: Owairoa's Softball Funday

## Former Owairoa Student Returns with Her Family

In a full-circle moment of global connections, Owairoa Primary School has welcomed back a very special visitor—Sooyun Choi, a former International Student from South Korea who studied here in the summer of 1997. This time she has returned as a mother, to give her own children the same enriching experience she had, all those years ago.

Sooyun's journey with Owairoa began when her parents, believing in the power of cultural immersion, sent her to New Zealand for a short-term study program. It was a bold decision at the time, but one that left a lasting impact on her life. Now, nearly three decades later, Sooyun has brought her husband Sam and two boys, Sunwoo and Sunjae back to Auckland, so they too can experience life at Owairoa Primary School.

For Sooyun, stepping back onto the school grounds was a trip down memory lane. Despite the passing years, she has found that the spirit of Owairoa remains unchanged: a place where students from all over the world feel welcomed and inspired.

Here is Sooyun's personal reflection on her journey back to Owairoa:

My experience with Owairoa Primary School is truly special.

It all began on an ordinary summer day in Seoul, South Korea, in 1996. That day, my parents came across an advertisement in a major newspaper about a summer school and homestay program in New Zealand. They firmly believed that true learning stemmed from cultural experiences. Though they had never been to New Zealand and knew little about its education system, they understood the value of cultural immersion.

At the time, a guardian visa was not required, so I embarked on the journey alone, accompanied by a group of other Korean students whose parents likely shared the same belief. I was the brave one.

Now, 29 years later, I have returned to Owairoa with my own two children and my husband, my life's partner. At first, my husband found my story unbelievable. Many people asked, Do you really remember so much from 30 years ago? But I was resolute and certain.

I am deeply grateful to Owairoa Primary School, Principal Alan McIntyre, and the wonderful staff for fostering such a warm, inclusive, and strong community to this day. Although my stay this time is brief, I hope it marks the beginning of a bright future—not just for my children, but for the next generation as well.


# Digital Dream Lab Up and Running

The new Digital Dream Lab has quickly become an exciting and inventive space where learners are fully engaged in exploring technology. One of the most exciting aspects has been seeing their ideas come to life through 3D printing. As they design and print their creations, they are developing a deeper understanding of how technology can be used to solve real-world problems.

A key focus has been learning how to manipulate 3D objects online. Learners are developing the skills to combine shapes, punch through them, and rotate them on multiple axis to fit specific design purposes. This hands-on experience is not only boosting their creativity but also strengthening their spatial awareness and problem-solving skills. Additionally, it is improving their understanding of measurement in millimetres, as precise measurements are essential for successful 3D printing. They are learning to carefully adjust dimensions to ensure their designs fit together correctly, reinforcing the importance of accuracy in real-world applications..

At the same time, learners are gaining an understanding of how 3D printers work, from the digital design process to the mechanics of printing itself. They are becoming familiar with the expectations and rules of the Digital Dream Lab, ensuring that they use the space and its resources responsibly.

A highlight for many has been the excitement of logging in each afternoon using their ID cards. This small ritual has helped create a sense of ownership and belonging, making the Digital Dream Lab a place where learners feel motivated and inspired to explore, create, and innovate.

## **Inconsiderate Parking**









We have received the following communication from an Owairoa neighbour, who requested we share their ongoing concern parking over driveways around our school community ....

Since the new school year has begun, we have seen an increase in the number of parents parking vehicles over private driveways as they drop their children off at school. Attached are photos of two recent events. There have been a number of others that we have not photographed.

I note another of our neighbours has had to place her own "No Parking" sign outside her address due to the inconsiderate parking by parents from your school. Another has resorted to using his own wheel-clamp to get the message through.

Previous complaints about parking have had temporary impacts, but there seems to be a belief by some that they "are only going to be a few minutes" and therefore no harm is caused. Our neighbourhood is a mixture of ages and includes many people who need to travel to work in the mornings. Their travel is delayed by these inconsiderate actions of parents who seem reluctant to travel a few more metres up the road to find a legitimate park.

Please remember that parking laws apply to you, even if it is "only for a few minutes"

## **Cycling and Scootering to School**

At our school, student safety is our top priority. While local police guidelines allow children aged 10 and over to cycle to school independently, our School Board discourages this due to the busy and potentially hazardous roads surrounding our school.

Only Year 6 students are permitted to ride a cycle to and from school and they must have written parental permission before applying to the Deputy Principal for authority to ride their bikes. Students with permission must place their cycles in the cycle stands beside Room 1.

Ensuring our students arrive safely each day is a shared responsibility, so we encourage families to consider alternative transport options that minimise risk.

For those who choose to accompany their child on a scooter to and from school, please be aware that scooters are not permitted to be ridden within the school grounds for health and safety reasons. As we do not have a designated storage area for scooters during the school day, they will need to be taken home after drop-off.

We appreciate your support in prioritising student safety and working with us to ensure a secure and smooth start and end to each school day.
