Exploring the World of Plants



This term the Junior School has been immersing itself in the fascinating world of plants as part of our Science inquiry into the Living World. The focus has been on understanding the different parts of a plant and exploring what they need to grow and flourish.

To make this learning experience even more engaging, our students have been conducting fun experiments to discover how various conditions affect plant growth. They've tested different methods of growing plants to see which is the best way.

Recently, our Year 1 and 2 students had the opportunity to visit the Botanical Gardens, where they enjoyed a hands-on experience that deepened their understanding of plant life.

The day started with eager students who were excited for the bus ride, chatting enthusiastically and full of energy. Once at the gardens, the behaviour of the students was fantastic, and they displayed great curiosity throughout the day.

The educators at the gardens were wonderful, guiding them through the different activities and making the learning experience both fun and educational. They worked closely with the garden educators, learning more about how plants grow. A favourite part of the visit was discovering the important role worms play in maintaining healthy soil. The students were excited to see these fascinating creatures in action!

Each student also had the chance to plant a pea seed, which they took home and care for. Then we explored the Potter's Children's Garden, where they completed a scavenger hunt, found tadpoles and weta, and many plants they recognised. The Edible Garden was the next stop where they learned about vegetables and herbs that can be grown at home. Some students saw vegetables they had never heard of and the biggest sunflower they had ever seen!

The trip was such a memorable day, with many students calling it "the best day ever!" We are incredibly grateful to our parent helpers, whose support made this trip possible. Everyone learned so much about what it takes to grow a healthy seed! The bus ride home was certainly a lot quieter!

This term has been a truly exciting and enriching journey for our budding botanists, and we can't wait to see how their plants continue to grow and flourish!



Game, set and ...lots of fun

In true Owairoa fashion our Junior School learners were in for a treat at the start of the year.

Our Year 1 and Year 2 classes had the privilege in participating in an introductory tennis programme "The Kids Tennis Activation", provided by the Howick Tennis Club.

The children were exposed to the basics of tennis, learning to throw and hit a ball over the net, to wait in position and to move in position in anticipation of hitting the ball. They practised the serve motion, as well as throwing a tennis ball up and hitting it over the net. Students also learned about forehand and backhand while having lots of fun running around and working with a buddy.

Improving Visibility on Elliot Street

Auckland Transport has contacted our school regarding upcoming works on Elliot Street, and have confirmed the project will be undertaken in April 2025.

Auckland Council wrote:

As part of the works, Auckland Transport is improving visibility on Elliot Street. We've received requests from residents and Owairoa Primary School, to improve driver visibility and address parking concerns on Elliot Street due to parking over berms and footpaths during school drop off and pick up.

We have reviewed the area and have decided to remove some existing yellow broken lines along Elliot Street. This will increase the number of available places to park and discourage drivers from blocking the footpath and driveways and potentially damaging berms and underground services



We cannot remove all yellow broken lines as they are needed to prevent drivers from parking on bends and intersections and blocking drivers view of approaching vehicles.

- Removing broken yellow lines outside numbers 39 and 41 Elliot Street
- Removing broken vellow lines outside Blundell Park





Attendance Matters

One of the major initiatives of the Government is to get students to school every day that the school is officially open for instruction. In April last year, the Government announced a regular attendance target of **80 percent of students to be present for more than 90% of the term**

Four **Student Attendance Categories** have been developed to help you understand how frequently your child attends school.

Student Categories	Student with	Equivalent to
Regular attendance	over 90% attendance	missing fewer than 5 days across a term
Irregular absence	more than 80% and up to 90% attendance	absent for between 5 and 9 days across a term
Moderate absence	more than 70% and up to 80% attendance	absent for between 10 and 14.5 days across a term
Chronic absence	70% attendance or less	absent for 15 days or more across a school term

These categories give you a way to monitor the progress you are making in supporting your child to attend regularly. Your child's school report will now include a section on their attendance during the term.

I wish to share with you a snapshot of our school wide data on school attendance and getting to school on time.

Number of students who attended our school regularly in Term 4, 2024

Regular Attendance

Irregular Absence 20%

Compared to 23% in Term 4, 2023

Moderate Absence 6%

Compared to 9% in Term 4, 2023

Chronic Absence 4%

Compared to 4% in Term 4, 2023

The following were the main reasons given for absence in Term 4

- 1. (M) Illness / Medical Absence 45%
- 2. (G) Holiday 25%
- (E) Accepted (but unjustified) 16%
- 4. (T) Unexplained / Trivial 11%
- 5. (J) Justified (other) 2%

The Government also collect data on the percentage of students who arrive at school, ready to start their learning on time each day.

In Term 4, 2024 **79%** of our students arrived at school on time.

I am challenging you to get your child to school every school day and to get them to school on time.

Our school welcomed renowned graffiti artist Jonny 4Higher to transform the end of Room 18 into a breathtaking mural by former students, Nicole Large, who won the Carus Commercial Painting Group's Mural Competition last year.

The nationwide competition invited school students from across New Zealand to submit their creative mural designs, with the winning entry earning the honour of being painted at their school.

Nicole, who was a Year 6 student in Room M17 at the time, wowed the judges with her beautifully detailed design featuring native New Zealand birds. Her concept carries a powerful message about teamwork and unity. "It shows four birds working together to build a nest, meaning when we work together, we can achieve goals," she explained.

The transformation of her design from paper to wall has been an exciting journey for our staff and students, watching the artist bring her vision to life.

Senior Blog - Smooth Sailing



Ahoy there! This week the Year 5 and 6 students became the captains of their own miniature ships as they set off to the Bucklands Beach Yacht Club located at Little Bucklands Beach for a jam-packed day of knot tying, sail measuring and boat steering!

For every class, the full-on day was divided into two main events. Half the day was spent rotating around one of the yacht club clubrooms and gaining a hands-on insight into the key components of sailing, and the second half was spent giving it a go!

Inside the clubroom, students got stuck into mastering complicated knot tying techniques, preparing and testing different pulley systems, experimenting with tin foil boats and weights, and measuring the perimeter of different boat sails. With short rotations the students were able to gain valuable knowledge about the ins and outs of sailing while giving everything a try!

The students then headed outside to meet the highly experienced instructors who guided them through a careful sailing tutorial, ensured that all safety guidelines were covered in detail, and got them out on the water in pairs. Year 5 and 6 students had the time of their lives steering the Optimist boats with the constant guidance and words of advice of the instructors, who were watching closely from nearby motorboats. After nearly two hours spent on the water the students still did not want to come back to shore!

The Senior School trip took place over three days and was a hugely successful affair. Mr Rossiter's detailed organisation of the event and the amazing work of the Bucklands Beach Yacht Club experts concluded in our students enjoying an incredible extra-curricular experience. We're already looking forward to having the opportunity to visit again in the future!
