

Science in a Van Brings Learning to Life

In Week 4 our Junior School students were treated to an exciting and educational visit from Science in a Van, who brought a mix of science and storytelling to the stage with their performance of Billy Goats Gruff – A Tale of Competing Forces.

The show linked the well-known fairy tale to our current science topic: Forces – Push and Pull. With the classic characters of the three billy goats and the troll guarding the bridge, the story explored how forces like pushing, pulling, and friction affect movement. The goats had to figure out how to get across the bridge using different types of force, even using a skateboard at one point.

The presenters from Science in a Van were enthusiastic and knowledgeable, and they reinforced the key concepts our students have been learning in class, including how things move, how forces affect objects, and how friction can slow things down or help things grip. By linking these ideas to a familiar story, the learning was made meaningful and memorable.

It was a fantastic way to bring science to life and consolidate our learning in a hands-on experience. Students were engaged the entire time and there was much laughter from all.



Young Ocean Explorers Inspire Our Students

On the 7th of August, our Year 4–6 students had the privilege of hearing from Riley Hathaway of Young Ocean Explorers (YOE).

For the past 12 years, Riley and her underwater cameraman and storyteller dad, Steve, have been on a mission to inspire young people to love and protect the ocean. Their journey began almost by accident—when Riley was in Year 7, Steve helped her with a school project on sea turtles. The incredible reaction to her presentation made them realise they could share their passion with a wider audience. That spark led to the creation of YOE and, soon after, 20 episodes for the children’s TV favourite ‘What Now’.

Today, the YOE website (www.youngoceanexplorers.com) is free for everyone to access. Full of engaging videos, quizzes, polls and resources in both English and Te Reo Māori, it has become a much-loved tool for thousands of New Zealand students and teachers wanting to learn about the marine world. At the heart of it all is Riley and Steve’s mission: to inspire us to practise Kaitiakitanga—guardianship of our ocean.

Riley also shared some powerful facts with our students:

- 93% of New Zealand’s territory is underwater
- 30% of our land is protected
- but only 0.38% of our ocean is fully protected

With Riley and Steve being minor celebrities here in Aotearoa, we were extremely fortunate that Riley was able to slot us into her busy schedule. A huge thank you to Riley—we loved meeting you in person. Your passion for the moana shone through, and we are on board with your message: Looking after the ocean is for people like us!

PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST MEASLES

- Measles is one of the most contagious viruses that spreads easily between people and makes most people feel very unwell. It spreads very easily from person to person by breathing in air after a person with measles has sneezed, coughed, talked or even just breathed. Measles can also be spread after touching tissues, toys or other surfaces contaminated with an infected person's nose and throat secretions.

With measles being a highly contagious illness, schools are particularly vulnerable due to the close contact environment. Just one infected person can quickly spread the illness to many others. Immunity matters.

The measles vaccine is very effective at preventing measles. Across New Zealand, people's immunity to measles is very low as not enough people are fully immunised against the illness. This puts us at high risk of an outbreak. Confirmed measles cases linked to overseas travel have recently been identified in New Zealand.

You are considered immune if you have previously had measles, or received two doses of a measles vaccine after the age of 12 months.

Be alert to the signs and symptoms of measles, which can include:

- fever
- cough
- runny nose
- sore red eyes
- a blotchy rash

If you or someone you know has symptoms that you are worried about, contact your GP or Healthline on 0800 611 116 for health advice and support.

Update on Relocatable Classrooms

You may have noticed that work is currently underway around the five relocatable classrooms positioned on our bottom field. These classrooms were originally brought onto our site to provide learning spaces while the top classrooms were being demolished and rebuilt.

Now that the new 18 class McIntyre Centre classroom block is complete and fully in use, these temporary classrooms are no longer required at Owairoa. They are being carefully refurbished here on site so that they can be relocated to other schools in need of additional classroom spaces. This is an economical way for us to support other school communities, while ensuring that the buildings continue to be put to good use within the local school network.

The positive outcome for our students is that once the classrooms are moved off-site, the area will be restored to an open grass playing field. This will give our students more space to enjoy during their play and lunchtime breaks and will enhance the outdoor environment of our school.

We appreciate your interest and patience while this transition takes place, and we look forward to seeing our students enjoying the extended green space in the near future.

School Blog Update

Junior School Blog



The Junior School has made a fantastic start to Term 3. The classrooms are full of energy, curiosity, and share a love for learning as our learners dive into new topics and hands-on experiences.

In Mathematics, our focus has been on learning about 2D and 3D shapes through geometry. The children have been exploring the features of different shapes – such as sides, corners, faces and edges, and learning the names of both flat and solid shapes. Learning about geometry is important because a strong understanding of shapes helps children to make sense of the world around them. Shapes are everywhere in our daily lives – from road signs, to buildings, art and nature. Recognising and describing shapes helps to develop early spatial awareness, visual thinking, problem-solving skills and understanding symmetry.

Our ISTEAM learning has been just as exciting, with a focus on push and pull forces. The children have been actively exploring how things move and how different forces are used every day. Whether we are opening a door, pushing a trolley or pushing a swing, we are constantly using push and pull movements. We have been investigating these forces through experiments; role playing and problem-solving challenges. These hands-on activities help to make scientific concepts feel real and relatable, encouraging teamwork, innovation and discovery. Understanding forces helps children to think like engineers – asking questions, testing ideas, and exploring how things work.

We are so proud of the enthusiasm our Junior Students have shown towards their learning. The nature of these topics has sparked rich conversations, creative thinking and lots of movement as students explore how forces affect the way objects move in our everyday lives. The children love working together, testing ideas, and making connections between their play and the science behind it. Across all curriculum areas, our classrooms are buzzing with activity, confidence is growing, and developing key skills that will support them throughout the year. We look forward to continuing this positive momentum as we move further into Term 3.

Middle School Blog - Exploring Forces



This term in science, our middle school learners have been exploring the world of forces. Each week, they have taken part in fun, hands on lessons in the science room with fascinating experiments, videos, and group discussions.

Middle School have learned about gravity, magnetism, friction, and motion. One of the favourite activities was testing magnetic poles. Learners were excited to see how magnets can both attract and push away from each other. They were even more surprised to learn that Earth acts like a giant magnet!

A highlight was the Pointing North experiment. We used two needle-magnets to find out how Earth pulls on magnets. By rubbing the needles in one direction on a magnet, we turned them into temporary magnets. Then we checked which end pointed north by using a compass.

These science lessons have not only taught us about forces, but they have also helped learners work together, ask questions, and solve problems. We're excited for more experiments as we keep learning about how forces shape our world!
